

INTRODUCTION



In 2022, millions of young Europeans were classified as NEETs. This group faces particular risks of long-term exclusion. Tackling NEET status requires comprehensive strategies:

- Skills training.
- Mentorship programs.
- Targeted support for disadvantaged youth.



EU RESPONSES TO YOUTH UNEMPLOYMENT

The EU has implemented policies such as:

- Youth Guarantee: ensuring every young person receives an offer of work, training, or education within four months of leaving school.
- European Social Fund+ (ESF+): supporting job creation and skills development.
- Erasmus+: improving employability through mobility and non-formal learning.

- Develops transferable skills: leadership, communication, teamwork.




BARRIERS TO YOUTH ENTREPRENEURSHIP

- Adapting to artificial intelligence and automation.


Without these skills, youth risk being excluded from the labor market.
